06:00 – 08:00	Depart from School	<p>Teacher introduces the day’s theme: <i>“Today we’ll see how the cheetah survives in nature and how the Himba people live close to nature.”</i></p> <p>Safety briefing and morning energizer song.</p>
08:00 – 08:45	Arrival @ Cheetah Conservation Fund (Otjiwarongo)	Warm welcome, restroom break, short orientation about the centre and its mission to save the cheetahs.
08:45 – 09:00	Cheetah Run (Morning Exercise)	<p>Watch rescued cheetahs sprint in their exercise field. Guides explain how cheetahs are the fastest land animals and why they need space to run.</p> <p>Learners act out “cheetah moves” — a fun mini-stretching activity.</p>
09:00 – 10:00	Cheetah Feeding & Observation	<p>Watch resident cheetahs being fed from a safe distance. Guides explain diet, habitats, and why some cannot return to the wild.</p> <p>Children answer: “What do cheetahs eat?” “How fast is a cheeta?”</p>
10:00 – 10:30	Education Centre Visit & Mini-Activity	<p>Explore the Visitor Centre exhibits: cheetah skeleton, skulls, fur patterns, and the role of the Livestock Guarding Dogs.</p> <p>Learners pair up for a “cheetah fact hunt” — find and share one fact each.</p>
10:30 – 11:00	Snack Break	<p>Enjoy snacks.</p> <p>Reflection question: “Why do farmers and cheetahs need to share the land?”</p>
11:00 – 12h30	Travel to Omapaha Himba Village (Etosha area)	<p>Guide start a short story on the bus: <i>“Imagine living in a village where people use red ochre and milk to care for their skin.”</i></p>
12:30 – 13:30	Guided Tour of Omapaha Himba Village	<p>Learners meet Himba hosts and explore traditional huts made from mud and dung. See how ochre and butterfat are mixed for skin care, how hair styles show age and status, and how families share chores. Guides explain respect for elders and ancestors.</p>

13:30 – 14:30	Cultural Interaction & Song	Participate in a Himba children’s song or rhythm game. Learners can try simple hand-drumming or clapping patterns.
14:30 – 15:00	Lunch Break	Packed lunch
15:00 – 16:15	Creative Activity	Art time: draw a Himba home or family scene or model a clay hut. Teachers label key elements (“fireplace,” “hut,” “cow”).
16h30-19h00	Return to School	Group reflection on the bus — “What did I learn from the cheetahs?” “What did I learn from the Himba?”

08:00 – 08:45	Arrival at Harnas Wildlife Foundation (Gobabis area)	Warm welcome, meet guides and animal caretakers. Learn about Harnas’ mission to rescue and care for wildlife.
